Cruise Update Feb 2017

Like most of you, I have projects in the works. My fickle Tohatsu outboard is disassembled in my garage with, among other issues, a fuel tank with a cracked spout. Much to do on the boat, too.

In my case, I have a sabbatical between now and our cruising season. For those who have been following the adventures of NSA members Howard and Ros Cheetham, s/v Misto, in the World ARC Rally, you may know that I will be joining them in the Galapagos Islands later this month and crewing with them across the Pacific to the Marquesas and Tuamotu islands (French Polynesia). 2017 NSA Seminars

A few years ago, the NSA began offering seminars under the banner of "NSA Seminar Series". At that time, we targeted the seminars for the winter months and ending after the Oriental Boat Show. We also joined with the Sailing Club of Oriental (SCO) to jointly offer some of the seminars. For 2017 we have again joined with SCO to provide seminars on a variety of topics. This year we will offer more seminars than ever before. Many vendors are participating including World Wide Marine Training who is joining us to provide some of their knowledgeable instructors on an expanded list of topics. We are now looking at fifteen or more seminars that are in the planning stage. As they are confirmed, staffed, and scheduled we will add them to the calendar. See the sidebar in this newsletter for the list of seminars that are scheduled (color coded green) to date and also listed in the NSA <u>events calendar</u>.

A few seminars are scheduled on a Tuesday or a Thursday to accommodate SCO members but most are on a Saturday. Unless otherwise stated in the event details on the NSA calendar, all seminars will begin at 9:00 am. If no registration is required, just mark your calendar and show up. However, all of the venues we use require that the general public be permitted to attend. Although most venues will accommodate a fairly large crowd, they all have a posted size limitation. When that limit is reached the doors will be closed. So, arrive early to be sure you get a seat. We have one seminar that is restricted due to the hands on effort and the additional space that is required. For that seminar we are requiring a registration form. We still are trying to schedule a few more seminars and will let you know if they are scheduled.

Don't be an April fool! This check is a serious exercise in good seamanship! To facilitate the safety checks and ensure efficient use of everyone's time, we have established an online signup sheet (here). The Cape Lookout Sail and Power Squadron will use the Sea Harbor Yacht Club as their "base" and will come to your boat in your marina, based on your sign-up information. Please sign up if you choose to participate so they have an accurate method of allocating their resources and know how many vessels are at each marina. Information needed on the spreadsheet will include vessel name, marina name and slip number, phone contact for the person requesting the examination, and morning or afternoon preference when you will be available that day. Last year we started at 9 AM and most checks were completed by noon. Thank you for helping everyone be safe on the water!

NSA Members in ARC

Misto on the World ARC - St Lucia to the Pacific

The last month has seen us travel from St Lucia to Santa Marta Columbia, Columbia to the San Blass Islands and onward to Panama and through the Panama Canal to the Pacific ocean. At the time of writing we are at La Playata, Panama City, and will be departing any day now for the Las Perlas Islands.

We have sailed in conditions ranging from challenging (36 knots and 12' seas between Santa Marta and the San Blass islands), to trivial (motoring for 12 hours on the passage from St Lucia to Santa Marta!)

The San Blass Islands were stunningly beautiful and deserve a stay of several months – they are on our "return" list. We were able to experience the local indigenous Kuna peoples' culture and attended a celebration for the coming of age of young women on one of the island villages.



Shelter Bay Marina on the Atlantic side of the Panama Canal is the staging point for sailing vessels transiting the canal. We enjoyed a trip to the new Panama Canal visitors' center and watched a huge ship (\$1M to traverse) pass through the locks. The new locks have sliding gates, rather than traditional swing lock gates, and the ships require tugs to go through rather than the electric train "mules" that are used in the old locks.

In the Panama Canal transit we were rafted to another 43' catamaran, Forget-me-not. We transited through the old locks and completed the Gatun locks in late afternoon. The following day we completed the transit through Gatun Lake and the Pedro Miguel and Miraflores locks on the Pacific side. Finally under the bridge of the Americas we welcomed the Pacific. Each year about 1400 sail boats make this passage and we consider ourselves privileged to be one of that number.

Chuck and Sharon will leave us once we reach the Galapagos in mid-February and Carl Crothers will join us. I want to heartily thank Chuck and Sharon for being wonderful crew. It's been a pleasure to have them on board. We will be sorry to see them depart but are really looking forward to the Pacific leg with Carl.
